Galveston Island accumulated a record high of seaweed this year, and while we complain about the smell as it decays, the coastal ecosystem is largely dependent on seaweed for its survival, according to Robert Webster, lead researcher of the Sargassum Early Advisory System at Texas A&M Galveston. Until the past few weeks the beach at the end of Jolly Roger has been inaccessible. Luckily it has slowed down and we now have access not only to the beach on Jolly Roger but for the first time in almost a year we also at the end of Ocean Blvd. Maybe the Aggie is right!
